# COVID learning loss?



- What are the long term effects?
- Socially, emotionally, and academically?
- No one knows yet, we will have folks studying this for years.

The reassuring thing is **everyone** experienced this event in some form; every person has been affected in some way.





# COVID credit loss?



- All students in grades  $9^{th} 12^{th}$  must pass 7 or 8 classes each quarter to be on track for their graduation.
- Each F, I, NG, NC contributes to a student's lack of readiness and results in a "not on track" to graduate.
- Low grades often correlates to low understanding or non-mastery of core subjects.
- We know failure rates have escalated during the last 5 quarters of school due to COVID & loss of in-person learning.







- Remediation are classes to make up lost learning and strengthen mastery of foundational knowledge and skills.
- Credit Recovery is for students in the  $9^{\text{th}} 12^{\text{th}}$  grades.
- Credit Recovery is very similar to remediation but is specifically designed to recover credit for classes that have been failed in the past.





### Remediation/Recovery classes



- Every school district will have some remediation and credit recovery classes this summer. Some schools have been doing CR this year.
- These will differ slightly but all will be at no cost to families this summer due to funding for the
- Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief.
  ESSER funding (Part of the CARES Act)
- Some districts will have a program at every one of their schools.
- Nutrition Services may be available at many schools.
- Summer feeding sites will still exist in every district.







- Research what will be available in your neighborhood schools, your school feeder area, and in your district.
- Advertise the availability of those programs to your friends and neighbors in EVERY way possible.
- Make a personal out reach to at least 3 families who may need these free services.



#### Leadership Convention 2021 Non traditional credits



- These may vary slightly district to district but did you know that credit towards a diploma may be earned through the following activities?
  - Work Release
  - Internships / job shadowing experiences
  - Participation in outside of school sports (gymnastics, rodeo, etc.)
  - Participation/completion of counseling & therapy programs.
  - Participation/completion of physical therapy for injuries.





# **Technical Programs**



Almost every district has a technical program where students earn high school credit while learning skills & certifications.

<u>Examples:</u> auto collision repair, barbering, CNA, computer programming, dental assisting, diesel mechanics, digital media, EMT, engineering, fire science, landscaping, medical assistant, nail tech, pharmacy tech, surgical tech, vet tech, welding.





## Non traditional credits (continued)



- Any student can go to a designated testing center to earn credit through testing. (All schools accept the credit.)
- <u>State Demonstrated Competency Assessment</u>
- For students in grades 9-12
- May not have taken any portion of the course at an accredited Utah School before testing.
- No cost for the exams
- Students may take the test once per year if they do not pass.
- No letter grade is awarded, only the P and credit toward graduation.
- NCAA may not accept credit. Check with your university and NCAA.
- Utah Regent's Scholarship does accept results.





### Non traditional schools

Almost every district has an Alternative School.

What do Alternative Schools have in common?

- Fewer students in the school/smaller school size.
- Small class size and emphasis on personal relationships.
- A variety of credit recovery options.
- Fewer credits for the diploma. (24 credits vs 27/28)
- Generally, the teachers are flexible and focused on personalized learning for their students.

#### Please become familiar with your district's Alternative School.



#### Use the **School Counselor** as your resource



- The school counselor is the <u>most familiar</u> with your student's graduation credits & requirements.
- <u>They are the expert at earning non traditional credits.</u>
- They are often the referral to other district programs.

Email them often for information specific to your teen. Be persistent.

Be sure to make an appointment if you need to meet with them by zoom or in person.





### Relationships are everything!



### It is simple human nature...

- Students don't want to learn unless the teacher likes them.
- No one wants to be around someone who doesn't like them.
- No employee works harder for a boss/manager that does not like them.

#### Humans are social creatures and we respond better to love & warmth.







- Students respond to educators who smile, exhibit kindness and warmth.
- Students need educators who know their names and remember personal information about them.
- Students will work hard for a teacher who loves them but also has high expectations.
- Some studies refer to this type of teacher as a "Warm Demander."







When conflicts or poor judgement happens:

- Students want a chance to tell their side of the story.
- Students have a deep need to be listened to and understood.
- Students want disciplinarians who see their potential and don't judge them for who they are in this moment.







- How do you nourish the relationships in your sphere?
  - 1. Get to know them as a person and ask about their lives.
  - 2. Make that weekly phone call, Facetime or visit.
  - 3. Express your gratitude often.
